A letter from the Greens Committee



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Hello fellow members,

If you have braved the cold this winter, undoubtedly you will have noticed that some trees on the golf course have been removed, and others planted. By our count, earlier this year there were no fewer than 16 trees on the golf course that were either dead or near the end of their life expectancy. While we are in the process of removing these trees, the course now boasts new Willow Oak, Nuttall Oak, and White Oak trees alongside some of our fairways and greens.

The greens committee is acutely aware that trees provide an important environmental and aesthetic benefit to the golf course. We are also aware that trees have the potential to cause serious problems to irrigation systems, compete with greens and fairways for nutrients and water, as well as impact light and airflow which are important to turf management. The USGA provides some interesting literature on these subjects, as well as advice for how to approach planting and maintaining trees on the golf course.



With these two visions in mind, we are taking care as we consider where and when to plant trees to replace the ones that are dead and dying. It is no longer advisable to simply plant replacement trees in the spaces where old trees have been removed. This is true for a number of reasons, including maintenance concerns listed above, the maturity of the trees themselves, and the difference in the modern game of golf - including distance - since the time that many of our trees were planted. Therefore, the committee is taking a long term approach. We have already identified some areas in which tree planting may be prudent. We have identified other which may benefit from a different aesthetic approach. Once all of the necessary trees are removed, we will observe how their absence impacts - both positively and negatively - playability and course conditions. With this information, we can make informed decisions about if, when, and where to replant trees in service to the long-term sustainability of the course.

As the winter progresses, you can anticipate that more of the dead trees may be removed from the property as well as some of the healthier trees pruned up in order to promote air flow, better turf conditions, and more opportunities for effective recovery shots. The work is ongoing, and we are looking forward to reaping the rewards once the spring comes and our many trees bloom again.

A Letter from the Business Office

Last month, we left off after learning that a new course had been designed and built in the early 1900s, opening for play in 1911. This was followed by the building of a new clubhouse at a cost of just under \$2,000—about \$64,000 in today's dollars—now that was a bargain! And on that note, we will return to the story...

So popular had soccer become that MFC fielded two teams in the 1920s and three in the 1930s. As a measure of their success, Moorestown players frequently were named to league all-star teams. More importantly, during this period, the club won the Manheim cup—symbolic of the league's first division championship—four times, in 1915, 1926, 1927, and 1935.

Women's field hockey thrived for more than half a century at the club, although there are few records. The 1910 drawings for the new golf course show a hockey field. It was moved from place to place as the game's fortunes rose, fell, and rose again. On October 19, 1947, the All-British Women's Field Hockey Team played here. The sport continued until 1964 when declining interest, beyond the college level, brought an end to play.

Records tell us little about the club's football, baseball, and lacrosse teams. All were short-lived. Of course, an historical basis exists for lacrosse, a very old American Indian game being played in pre-club days at the Chester Avenue grounds. Some Moorestown Historians have recorded interesting episodes of Leni Lenape Indians venturing into Chester Avenue homes to warm themselves by the fire.

New Home, New Spirit

Post World War I prosperity, and a full membership prompted a major building project. The 1911 clubhouse, and an even older caddy shack were no longer suitable for a thriving Field Club. At the trustees request, on March 8, 1922, a Philadelphia architect submitted finished drawings and fifteen pages of detailed specifications for a new 60,000 cubic foot clubhouse in modified Victorian style, brown and white in color. By the 28th of the month, seven Moorestown contractors had submitted bids ranging from \$13,910 to \$19,750. (somewhere between \$250,000 and \$360,000 in today's dollars).

Records do not identify the successful bidder, but they do indicate that construction began promptly. The building committee, in ordering the work to commence, made three interesting recommendations. One was completed, one partially completed, and one remains enigmatic:

- That the driveway beginning at the Chestnut Street entrance be extended along the north fence westward to Chester Avenue.
- That the old clubhouse be moved approximately 650 feet and adjoin the new clubhouse.
- That "clock golf" be located either to the east or west of the relocated club house.

The project was underwritten by a mortgage secured from the Burlington County Trust Company. It was to play an important role in the financial crisis which developed seventeen years later.

The new home, completed in 1923, became the focal point for the burgeoning social life of the members, and the community. The club had a long history of social activities centered around the family: picnics, children's games, color days, May Day festivities complete with the May Pole dance, Fourth of July band concerts and fireworks, tugs of war, potluck suppers, lunch box raffles, late afternoon socials—featuring tea and more robust refreshments. All out-of-doors. *Keep reading...*

The fine new home provided opportunities to expand and extend social life indoors. No longer did cold weather signal hibernation for the members. Luncheons, dinners, even breakfasts abounded. Dances for the young of age and young at heart were the order of the day. Many a Moorestown youngster took dancing lessons (including instructions in the bow, the curtsy, and good manners) at the Field Club. Card parties, wedding parties, birthday parties, anniversary parties, and no reason parties dotted the monthly calendar. At last, the trustees could meet regularly at the club, rather than in the presidents' homes.

The new building also inspired a keen sense of participation and cooperation on the part of the members. The willingness to give, to serve, and to take part was evident at all age levels. It manifested itself in the strong committee structure which kept the club humming. It was not unusual to see twenty to thirty people, usually couples, serve on long and short term committees. As a result, wholehearted cooperation and enthusiasm came easily. Humming with interesting activities for all ages, the Field Club attracted interesting new members and enjoyed an unparallelled heyday in the 1920s.

It wasn't long before this esprit de corps was put to a severe test.

Storm Clouds Gather

The 1930s began a difficult, almost disastrous period for the club. These were the days of the Great Depression. The cities teemed with bread lines, forlorn men selling apples on street corners. *"Brother Can You Spare a Dime"* was more than a song. Moorestown did not escape the heartaches of the nation. Family budgets were drastically cut. The first things to go were luxuries like club memberships.

Monthly trustees' meetings were grim affairs. The treasurer's report had ominous overtones. The secretary presented growing numbers of resignation letters. Some afforded a touching glimpse of life in Moorestown during dark days. One read:

"My wife and I have postponed writing this letter, almost too long. My income has been declining steadily and I can no longer afford more than basic necessities and our church. The friends we made at the club mean much to us, but I must reluctantly ask you to accept our resignation."

The conditions this member described were trying indeed, especially for the trustees. Some of the crises they faced, and their attempts to solve them are best portrayed by excerpts from board minutes of that period:

1931—"Interest in the club is waning"..."A committee was appointed to encourage contract bridge at the club and attract new members"..."A grace period for delinquent members was proposed."

1932—"294 bills, representing \$12,483.75, had been sent out, and as a result, \$6,004.50 was received"..."No Christmas presents for the staff"..."Club \$3,000 in debt at year end."

1933—"The club opened on Sundays, for the first time, to encourage new members."..."Another \$3,000 borrowed. Debt total, \$6,000"..."The possibilities of limiting the club's functions during the year 1934 to clubhouse activities, tennis, and soccer."..."Closing the club discussed."

This is a difficult time for the Field Club, and the tough times aren't over yet. More to come in March's newsletter.
